incorporated a very healthy and delicious meal plan, and it's definitely paid off. Within the first 2–3 weeks of the program, I lost an inch all the way around."

Workouts for the program took place at the OCC Fitness Complex at various times during the week and were open to all employees on campus. Each workout was up to one hour in length, and focused on different exercises, such as circuit training, cardio, or strength training. Personal assessments by instructor Courtney Nix also were offered to help employees reach their fitness goals.

For employees who struggle with exercise due to setbacks like injuries, a tailored program was just the ticket.

"My knees and shoulders have suffered with a few surgeries

for injuries I had earlier in my life," says Foundation Development Specialist Liz Parker. "With Courtney's knowledge and guidance, I gained strength and range of motion in ways I could have never achieved otherwise. As I age, I know these accomplishments will have a huge impact

Working out with colleagues also was a great way to stay accountable, and find encouragement.

"The other people who worked out with me and 'suffered' alongside me – they encouraged me to try, and pointed out when I was able to do more exercises than I could do even the week before," says Parker.

Nojiri won a \$500 cash prize for a 60-second video she created that highlights the importance of water in daily life. #### OCC Wins 2nd Place at Fall Championship Tournament

ast weekend, the College's Speech, Debate, and Theater team hosted 40 highly competitive two- and four-year colleges at the PSCFA Fall Championship Tournament. Schools in attendance included University of California Los Angeles, Arizona State University and Moorpark College, filling out 285 debate and 715 individual event slots.

OCC placed 2nd overall, earning 108 points and ranking just behind Mt. San Antonio College with 127 points.

"This time last year we were 3rd, so placing 2nd showcases our drive to remain a powerful force in collegiate forensics; we compete to win," said Director of Individual Events Shaw Davari.

Individual Events Coach Jimmy Gomez said, "I'm incredibly proud of the team. Not only were they exceptional competitors, but they were also brilliant ambassadors for OCC, assisting over 1,000 students, coaches, and visitors on our campus."

The Speech, Debate, and Theater team's next tournament is Close to the Coast at OCC mid-January.

### Multicultural Center Introduced to Campus at Open House

On Nov. 15 Coast employees were invited to an open house for the College's Multicultural Center, which is part of the recently renamed Global Engagement Center on campus (formerly the International Center). The event introduced OCC's campus community to the Multicultural Center and solicited ideas about what the center could be.

"The idea was to have people check out the facility, ask questions and contribute their ideas for the Multicultural Center," says Global Engagement Director Nathan Jensen.

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#### Pirates Capture Sequoias Tournament!

t was a worthwhile trip for the Orange Coast College women's basketball team as the Pirates swept their three games to win the Central Valley Conference Tournament.

In the opener on Friday, Coast (5-1) picked up a 72-61 win over Merced College. Trailing, 49-41, the Pirates rolled past MC in the fourth quarter, 26-12, to pick up the win. Chyann Pendergrass led the way with 19 points and 11 assists, while Michelle Wu added 11 points and five rebounds and Elizabeth Sakamoto tossed in 10 points.

In the championship semifinals, Coast's offense came to life in a BIG way, as the Pirates cruised to a 100-45 win over the College of San Mateo. It was the first time that OCC hit the 100-point mark in a game since Jan. 26, 2007, when the Pirates demolished Golden West, 102-33. The Pirates led 42-28 at the half before blowing away CSM in the second half, outscoring the Bulldogs, 58-17.

Coast was on fire from 3-point land, draining 21-of-44 from beyond the arc. Sydney Driggs led the way with five 3-pointers and a game-high 16 points. Danielle Obong went 4-for-4 from downtown en route to 14 points, while Bela Raimondi added 12 points and three steals.

With the win, the Pirates earned a trip to the tourney title game and there, Coast pulled out a hard-fought, 69-65 win over host Sequoias.

Undefeated heading into Sunday's matchup with Coast, the Giants (8-1) carried a 42-38 lead into the second half, but Coast responded with a 19-12 third quarter to grab a 57-54 advantage.

The Giants led 49-47 with 4:30 left in the third on a 3-pointer by Isabella Jimenez, but from there, Coast went on a 15-5 run to take the lead for good. A pair of 3-pointers by Obong and a trey from Jenna Miramontez helped spark the run that put the Pirates up for good.

COS would get to within a point a 64-63 with 2:46 left in the game, but Coast's defense clamped down and held the Giants to just one made layup the rest of the way.

Pendergrass, the tournament's Most Valuable Player, had 13 points, six rebounds and six assists, while Obong added 12 points.

Wu (21 points, eight rebounds, four assists) and Megan McCullough (22 points, 10 rebounds, six assists) also earned All-Tournament honors for the Pirates, who won their fifth straight game.
